

Digital Scholarship & Publishing Studio


The Studio collaborates with students, faculty, and staff on the development, design, and implementation of digital scholarly research projects and publications.

Housed in the University of Iowa Libraries, the Studio offers equitable access to space, technology, and digital expertise to shepherd projects from inception to archive.





Digital Scholarship & Publishing Summer Fellowship Program

Created in 2017, this summer fellowship program provides opportunities for PhD, DMA, and MFA students to benefit from an in-person, mentored digital scholarship internship experience in the University of Iowa Libraries Digital Scholarship & Publishing Studio.

Students are encouraged to develop their own projects and/or pursue the development of digital scholarly skills, and are given instruction on a host of software and other technology available to create their work.

The DS&P Summer Fellowship positions graduate students to pursue innovative ways of thinking about publishing and sharing their creative endeavors.

The Summer 2025 cohort marked **107 awarded graduate** students from more than **30 degree programs** since the program's inception.

Digital Scholarship & Publishing Studio Fellowship Structure



• 8-week summer session; collaboratively designed curriculum with project design and management tools in a supportive learning environment.



• Fellows have regular check-in meetings with their Studio staff mentor/s to develop ideas and troubleshoot obstacles.



• At least 20 hours of dedicated digital project or skills development work each week.




• Required class in digital scholarship through the Studio (1 s.h.). Fellows must complete all assignments and fulfill class requirements.

Summer Fellowship Course

Our collaboratively-designed curriculum is updated annually and emphasizes:

- Process over product
- Contemporary issues in digital scholarship
- Digital project management
- Communicating complex digital scholarship to a general audience
- Project planning and coordination
- Collaboration with and credit for project partners
- Cohort and community building
- Career and professional development

Eligibility, Funding, and Application Process

- **DMA, PhD, and MFA candidates are eligible** for a competitive, in-person, mentored digital scholarship internship experience.
- The Graduate College provides a stipend of \$5,500 plus a tuition scholarship for one credit hour course and 50% of the mandatory fees. Students are responsible for the remaining fees. Historically, approximately 10 fellows are selected for each summer cohort.
- Applications must be submitted online. Eligible students may nominate themselves for this award; however, nominations must be submitted by the student's department.
- Submission deadline for our Summer 2026 Fellowship Program is **Wednesday, February 4, 2026 at 5 p.m.** Submissions will be accepted in Workflow beginning Tuesday, January 20, 2026.

• Ineligible or unfunded activities include fully-remote experiences or combination awards (DS&P Studio Fellowship cannot be combined with other awards).

Student Materials

- Description of a student's proposed project/learning objectives; related experience; how the experience fits into the student's academic and career goals (500 word max).
- Transcript (unofficial acceptable)
- A one-page CV of educational and professional experience, honors and awards, and publications/creative works.

Letter of Support

• One letter from the nominee's advisor that includes an assessment of the student's qualifications to carry out the planned summer activities, and how it will impact the student's academic and career goals.

Project Proposal Best Practices



Consider examining and answering the following research questions in your project proposal:

- What is your project? Past projects include websites, podcasts, digital maps, open-educational resources, digital textbooks, artistic installations, and multimedia projects.
- What is your research question? What is the significance of the proposed digital project and methods?
- What research or data-gathering work have you already done for this project? Do you know what data, texts, or archival collections you will utilize and where to find those resources?
- What prior experience do you have with the proposed digital methods? What prior experience do you have with relevant digital skills, tools, and/or other collaborative digital projects?
- How does the proposed project relate to your degree and professional objectives?

Project Proposal Best Practices



Consider examining and addressing your learning objectives throughout your project proposal:

- What digital skillset, digital methods, or tools would you like to learn, and how do they relate to your research areas?
- How will this new skillset help you to achieve your degree and professional objectives?
- Have you done previous courework that introduced you to the digital skillset, method, or tools you are interested in learning?

Project Proposal Best Practices



In addition to including your degree objective and anticipated graduation date, we recommend highlighting the following experience in your one-page CV:

- Previous digital project experience.
- Related research experience relevant to the project and/or your learning objectives (employment experience, internship, GRA, practicum, library or archival research).
- Relevant classwork and digital skillsets (courses taken, digital methods utilized, software used, etc.).
- Evidence of collaboration or engagement with campus or community partners.

Requesting Letters of Support and Meeting Application Deadlines



Several weeks in advance of the application deadline, meet with or communicate with your advisor regarding the fellowship program, your proposed project/learning objectives for the summer, and your request for a letter of support.


- Provide your advisor with the materials they need to write your letter. Offer a rough draft of the project proposal and one-page CV.
- Be sure to let your advisor know how to direct your letter of support, as the department will need to submit application materials on your behalf.
- Some departments may set internal deadlines for applications that are earlier than the official graduate college deadline to allow time for submission. Always check with your department regarding such deadlines and communicate them to your advisor.
- Some advisors appreciate a kind reminder email a few days prior to the deadline and almost everyone appreciates a thank-you email following the completion of a letter of support.

Best Practices and Advice for Competitive Applications

As a graduate student, you can prepare successful applications in the following ways:
